ETCC Launches the Executive Plan for the **Nafis Youth Council Initiatives**



Under the decision of the Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council's board of directors, chaired by H.H. Sheikh Mansour bin Zayed Al Nahyan, Vice President and Deputy Prime Minister of the UAE, Minister of Presidential Court to approve the launching of the Nafis Youth Council (NYC), The Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council held its first official meeting for the NYC to launch its executive plan, initiatives and events. The meeting was under the patronage and presence of H.E. Sheikh Salem bin Khalid Al Qassimi, Minister of Culture and Youth, H.E Ghannam Al Mazrouei, Secretary General of the Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council (ETCC), leaders of the two entities, and members of the Nafis Youth Council.

H.E. Ghannam Al Mazrouei welcomed the audience at the event's start and congratulated the Nafis Youth Council members for their selection for this mission. H.E. clarified that the NYC will be a precious opportunity for direct, and continuous interaction and communication with the youth in the private sector under the supervision of the ETCC.

Al Mazrouei added: "This vital step supports the strategic goals of the Nafis program, significantly enhancing society's optimistic mindset of Emiratis working in the private sector, encouraging Emiratis to join the industry, and highlighting private companies' benefits from hiring Emirati talent.

Sheikh Salem bin Khalid Al Qassimi explained that the continuous cooperation between the Ministry of Culture and Youth and the Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council had produced this initiative, which will have a profound effect on serving Emirati graduates and youth looking for qualifications and training to get jobs, as well as the Emirati employees

who currently work in the private sector.

H.E. stressed the Ministry's support for the Nafis Youth Council and all its upcoming events and initiatives, noting that the NYC encompasses a plethora of prominent Emirati youth in the private sector who commend considerable experience and paramount success stories.

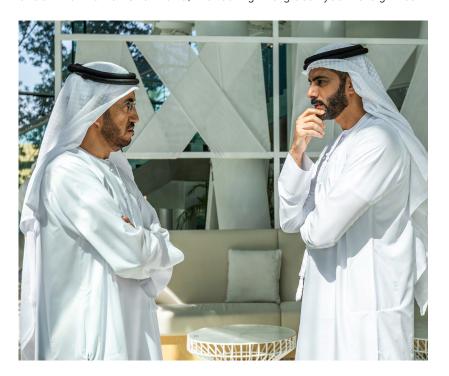
H.E. Ghannam Al Mazrouei, ETCC Secretary General, said that the chosen youth for the membership of the Nafis Youth Council would be the best ambassadors for the Nafis program and an actual transfiguration of its initiatives among the society and their Emirati peers".

H.E. asserted the ETCC's keenness to hold periodic meetings with the NYC members in the coming period to ensure their roles and missions and enhance



supporting the NYC strategic plan, initiatives, and projects during the year. Al Mazrouei called upon the Nafis Youth Council's members to put forward initiatives that benefit Emirati youth and strengthen their chances for qualification and recruitment in the private sector.

H.E. also stressed the importance of the simultaneous formation and launching of the Nafis Youth Council, with the start of the countdown for UAE's hosting of the Climate Change Conference (COP28), expected to be held at Expo Dubai in November, noting that the summit would be held under the theme "One World," reflecting the global youth's significant



role, where the Nafis Youth Council's role is aligned with the Conference objectives.

In his speech during the event, Ahmed Al Amoudi, NYC President, expressed that all NYC's members are looking forward to making their sincere utmost efforts to serve their Emirati brothers, expanding the benefits of NYC's success stories in the private sector and introducing those experiences as a role model for success and excellence in the private sector ecosystem. Al Amoudi stressed that the private sector constantly needs hardworking and talented youth, where there are tremendous opportunities for progress promotion.

For her part, Alia Al Nuaimi, the NYC Vice President, expressed the keenness of the NYC's members to cooperate with the ETCC to support and empower Emiratis to join the private sector. She also highlighted the assigned missions of NYC's members to carry out their pivotal role as ambassadors and representatives

of the UAE's youth working in the private sector.

The event included a brief explanation of NYC's strategy, action plan, and initiatives during 2023, with full integration with the Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council's goals and governmental vision.

The Nafis Youth Council will use plenty of tools to achieve those goals, including brainstorming sessions, ideas exchange, and commitment to roles and responsibilities, which include suggesting youth events that empower the Emirati youth, supporting their work in the private sector, participating in activities, media coverage, and discussions, highlighting the success stories and achievements, formulating youth's recommendations related to Nafis programs and initiatives, in addition to promoting the Nafis Award and related positive initiatives.

At the end of the event, Their Excellency Sheikh Salem Al Qassimi and Ghannam Al Mazrouei approved the Nafis Youth Council's executive plan and initiatives, which focus on the implementation and follow-up of the strategic initiatives for spotting all possible opportunities to support the government's efforts to raise the Emiratisation rates in the private sector.

About the Nafis Youth Council (NYC):

The Nafis Youth Council consists of 14 members, divided equally between males and females whose ages range from 18 to 35 years; each member commends considerable personal skills, general knowledge, and interest in youth causes. The NYC's appointed president reports to the ETCC's Secretary General, and the Nafis Youth Council tenor is two renewable years.



Agreements & Partnerships

By the end of the current year, the Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council will have signed 30 cooperation agreements; 5 of them target creating 11,500 jobs in five years, while 9 agreements aim to provide 11,750 training opportunities during the same period. 6 agreements seek to upskill of 2,000 students from the healthcare sector annually, whereas 10 agreements are dedicated to supporting the Nafis initiatives and programs.



Emirati Human Resources Development Council

The Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council signed an MoU with the Emirati Human Resources Development Council to provide recruitment opportunities and empower Emiratis in the private sector and especially in the real estate sector.

The Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council also signed an MoU with Abu Dhabi Maritime Academy to support the efforts and chances of the graduates and Emiratis registered with the "Talent" Program on the Nafis platform.





Moreover, the Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council signed an MoU with PwC's Academy to train and qualify the graduates and Emirati youth registered with the "Talent" Program to work and be hired in different fields. Taxation and Finance will be the first fields as a part of the In-Country Value program (ICV).

ETCC's Visits

As a part of the ETCC leadership's efforts to enhance the society's positive concept about Emiratis working in the private sector and improve cooperation with all the society's segments, H.E. Ghannam Al Mazrouei, ETCC's Secretary General made several field and societal visits to raise the awareness level of the Council and its initiatives, especially the Nafis Program. The visits highlighted the ETCC's role in developing and upskilling Emirati talent and empowering them within the private sector.

H.E.'s tour included a visit to His Highness Sheikh Humaid bin Rashid Al Nuaimi, Federal Supreme Council Member and Ruler of Ajman, which was attended by H.H. Sheikh Ammar bin Humaid Al Nuaimi, Crown Prince of Ajman. H.E. Al Mazrouei briefed both of them on the ETCC's programs, initiatives, plans, Nafis strategy, achievements in Emiratisation, and the increase in the number of Emiratis working in the private sector.

H.E. Ghannam Al Mazrouei, Secretary General of the Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council also visited H.H. Sheikh Mohammed bin Hamad Al Sharqi, Crown Prince of Fujairah and briefed him on the Nafis program's latest statistics, benefits, projects and initiative aiming to raise the competency of Emiratis in the UAE's private sector companies.

In addition, the ETCC in collaboration with the Ministry of Justice and in the presence of H.E. the Minister of Justice organized a workshop for local and foreign law firms and legal consultancies working in the UAE about the Nafis program.

Moreover, H.E. Ghannam Al Mazrouei, ETCC Secretary General visited Al Tiwayya Majlis in Al Ain, and Umm Sugeim Majlis in Dubai, where he gave awareness lectures and held discussions with the audience about the Nafis program.



Nafis is a federal governmental program encompassing several initiatives and programs, and aims towards raising the competitiveness of Emiratis cadres, and building partnerships with the private sector, to create 24,000 jobs annually and support more than 170,000 beneficiaries over the coming five years.

The Banking sector covers all entities governed by the UAE Central Bank including banks, insurance companies, exchange and financial houses.

The program is based on collaboration between the federal government and the private sector entities to build a strong and sustainable national economy.

The Nafis program encompasses 10 initiatives within 3 strategic directions

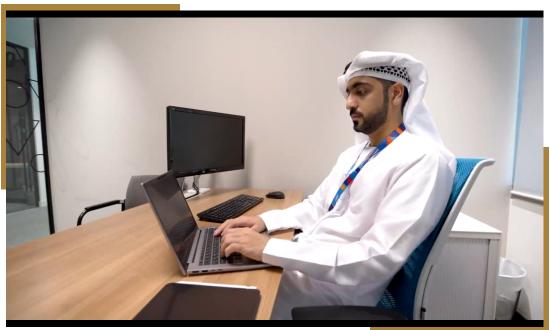

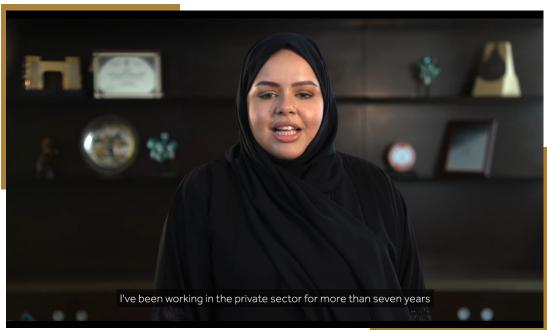

An Idol and Role Model for Youth Seeking Success and Uniqueness

Emirati youth always look to H.H. Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahyan as an idol and a role model for them. They consider him one of the most prominent Emirati and Gulf politicians. They admire his vital efforts to grow and develop Emirati society.

H.H. Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahyan was born in Abu Dhabi on April 30, 1972. He is the 16th son of the late Sheikh Zayed bin Sultan Al Nahyan. In 1995, His Highness earned his bachelor's degree in political science from the UAE University. Married to Sheikh Al Yazia bint Saif bin Mohammed Al Nahyan, H.H. has five children: Sheikh Fatimah, Sheikh Mohammed, Sheikh Zayed, Sheikh Saif, and Sheikh Theyab.

Abdullah bin Zayed is a Graduate of the Wisdom School.. Zayed's School of Giving

H.H Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahyan was the Undersecretary of the Ministry of Information from 1995 to 1997. He joined the federal government as Minister of Information and Culture from March 1997 until February 2006. He also worked as the National Media Council Chairman from July 2006 until March 2008, and as the UAE Football Association Chairman from 1993 until 2001.

On February 9, 2006, H.H. became the Minister of Foreign Affairs, and in February 2016, the ministry jurisdiction was expanded according to the new cabinet and became the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and

International Cooperation. H.H.'s responsibilities include building and enhancing international relations in all world forums and supervising the UAE's external international assistance.

In addition to his ministerial work, His Highness is also a member of the National Security Council. Vice President of the Borders Permanent Committee, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Anwar Gargash Diplomatic Academy, Chairman of Emirates Foundation. Vice President of Abu Dhabi Fund for Development, Chairman of Education & Human Resources Council, member of the Financial and Economic Committee, Chairman of the Supreme Committee for Supervising the National Strategy to Combat Money Laundering and Terrorist Financing, Chairman of the Supreme Committee responsible for preparing for the COP28 hosted by the UAE, and Chairman of the Emirates Council for Research and Development, and Vice Chairman of Emirati Talent Competitiveness Council.

Abdullah bin Zayed's Victory in the IRENA Battle is Engraved in History with Golden Letters

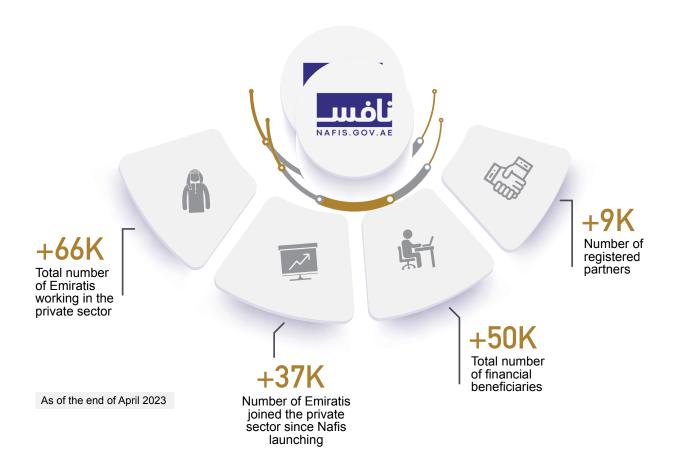

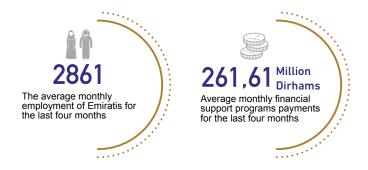

Time is the most precious asset in human lives. It can't be bought or compensated if lost. Aptly managing your time adds an extra layer of success to your life, increases your productivity, and makes your fingerprint on life last longer. To maximize your time, you should commit to some steps, such as preparing a todo list of small things arranged according to priority allocating a specific time to carry out each. Humans are not robots, and you can only work someday, so remember to dedicate time to relaxation, contemplation, and restoring your energy.

The delegation strategy is one of the most essential time management tools. You can generate more time to carry out vital tasks when you delegate tasks to another person, such as a family member or subordinates.

There are more helpful time management tools like keeping your room tidy and clean, using the proper office light, indexing and organizing your files and eliminating unnecessary ones.

When you start your daily routine, begin with the complex tasks and, unfavoured to you, divide them into smaller tasks to make it easier for you to accomplish them. Learning how to say "No" to all useless distracters is also essential.

You need also to keep your resolve to achieve the tasks you determined for that day regardless of the circumstances. Be sure to accomplish your daily tasks before the suitable mode or time. You have to expect some mistakes, so don't be sad if that happens; instead, learn and

benefit from them to improve the planning for the next day's tasks.

1-3-5 is one of the most essential time management tools to determine your daily tasks. It means you should pick up one big task, three medium-sized tasks. and five small tasks in your daily to-do list. This strategy will help vou focus on the main task which has to be done and filter out all distractors that reduce your productivity by 20%. Do not try to achieve more than one task at the same time. One mission at a time accelerates your performance, increases its quality, and makes it more creative.

Finally, focus your thinking on the positive points and enjoy every bite of your work. Remember that it's your day, your life, and lost time will never return.
